Suggested answer: Sample response: In terms of similarities, both selective and inaccurate observations are observations that are incorrect. The former, however, is more about choosing to see a phenomenon in a way that conforms to previous preferences or beliefs, while the latter is about observations that are based on faulty perceptions.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Social science research methods can reduce the likelihood of overgeneralization by using systematic procedures for selecting individuals or groups to study that are representative of the individuals or groups that we wish to generalize.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Positivism asserts that a well-designed test of a specific prediction—for example, the prediction that youth who are more attached and supervised by their parents will be less likely to engage in violent behavior—can move us closer to understanding actual social processes. Postpositivism is a philosophy that is closely related to positivism because it also assumes an external, objective reality, but postpositivists acknowledge the complexity of this reality and the limitations and biases of the scientists who study it.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Researchers can benefit from triangulation, or using a combination of one or more other methods, in their studies because it allows them to get a clearer picture of the social reality being studied by viewing it from several different perspectives.

Describe the advantages and disadvantages of using surveys as a research method.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Survey questions can be a straightforward and efficient means to measure individual characteristics, facts about events, level of knowledge, and opinions of any sort, but they can also result in misleading or inappropriate answers. All questions proposed for a survey must be screened carefully for their adherence to basic guidelines and then tested and revised until the researcher feels some confidence that they will be clear to the intended respondents. Some variables may prove to be inappropriate for measurement with any type of question.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Studying LGBTQ individuals and minority populations, for example, is important because if the unique issues they face are not accounted for, then the research findings could not be generalized to the larger diverse population. Studying these two types of groups allows for a special understanding of how structural issues in society influence the reality of individuals in these groups. Asking questions for a homogenous sample may not apply to these subpopulations.

Suggested answer: Sample response: A recent news network reported that an immigrant youth killed his parents. Then the news went on to say that all immigrant youth are prone to violence. This is an example of an overgeneralization, which occurs when we conclude that what we have observed or what we know to be true for some cases is true for all cases.

Imagine that you are a criminological researcher interested in studying violence. Describe what in particular you are interested in learning. Then indicate which type of social science research you should employ and why.

Suggested answer: Sample response: I am interested in understanding the causes of violence. Since I am interested in the causes of violence, I would use explanatory research. I chose this type of social science research because I am interested in learning about what causes violence, rather than describing the who, what, where or when violence occurs.

A program intended to reduce violence in schools taught youth coping skills on how to deal with stress and negative emotions. Suggested answer: Sample response: Here are two potential reasons: (1) Evaluations conducted with scientific methods would provide a more accurate representation of whether or not the program was working and worthy of being funded for another year. (2) Sometimes we have selective observations and would see the ways the program was working but ignore the areas that it wasn't working. As such, it would be important to have the program evaluated so that the school board can know if the appropriate outcomes were reached by the program and if changes should be made.

Q70. [Essay]

A researcher wants to examine what factors predict both youth delinquency and violence. First indicate what type of research would be needed and then provide at least three research questions that the researcher could ask.

Suggested answer: *Sample response: The researcher should engage in explanatory research, which seeks to identify causes and effects of social phenomena to predict how one phenomenon will change or vary in response to variation in some other phenomenon. The questions that the research could ask are: How does a youth's relationship with their parents affect a youth engaging in violence and delinquency? Does parental supervision affect this? What about the parent's criminal behavior?*
