Suggested answer: Sample response: selective and inaccurate observations, overgeneralization, illogical reasoning, and resistance to change. Answers should elaborate on how to avoid these by recognizing these errors for what they are and making a conscious effort to avoid them.

Q42. [Essay]

Compare and contrast descriptive and exploratory research.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Defining and describing social phenomena of interest is a part of almost any research investigation, but descriptive research is often the primary focus of the first research about some issue. Exploratory research seeks to find out how people get along in the setting under question, what meanings they give to their actions, and what issues concern them. The goal is to learn "What is going on here?" and to investigate social phenomena without explicit expectations.

Explain the limitations and strengths to social science research and give an example.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Research always has some limitations and some flaws (as does any human endeavor) and our findings are always subject to differing interpretations. Social research permits us to see more, observe with fewer distortions, and to describe more clearly to others what our opinions are based on, but it will not settle all arguments. Others will always have differing opinions, and some of those others will be social scientists who have conducted their own studies and drawn different conclusions. In this way, one research study often leads to another, and another, each one improving on previous research or examining a research question from a somewhat different angle.

Suggested answer: Sample response: policy motivations, academic motivations, and personal motivations.

Social researchers undertake research for various reasons. If you were going to propose research on student success in university settings, describe potential sets of motives from each of the following perspectives: personal interest, policy guidance/program management, and academic concerns.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Policy motivations—government agencies, elected officials, and private organizations; academic motivations—changing social relations; personal motivations—improving the quality of communities.

Q56. [Essay]

Consider the research conducted on Internet use and other forms of social relations, as described in Chapter 1. Which conclusions are most consistent with your own casual observations about social relations in the United States? List three of your own observations that are either consistent with or contradict conclusions found in the text. Describe how you might propose descriptive research to test whether your observations hold up to scientific criteria. In addition, be specific about the types of errors in everyday reasoning that might apply to your casual observations.

Suggested answer: Sample response: U.S. Bureau of the Census of approximately 54,000 households revealed that 63.5% of the population had a broadband connection in their homes; two types of WiFi users—secondary work office or a tool for meeting others, mobile phones increase social ties, Internet use differs dramatically between social groups; descriptive research—defining and describing social phenomena, selective and inaccurate observation, overgeneralization, illogical reasoning, and resistance to change.

Review each of the four errors in scientific research and evaluate the relative difficulties they create. Answer in terms of a specific research area, such as understanding homelessness, crime, or adaptations to communities or work organizations.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Answers will vary but should include selective and inaccurate observation, overgeneralization, illogical reasoning, and resistance to change.

Q58. [Essay]

Explain how individual studies are part of the larger process of creating social scientific knowledge. Consider why research must evaluate previous research and why researchers should expect to have their studies critically evaluated.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Social science—relies on scientific methods in order to investigate individuals, societies, and social processes; each study fits back into the context of social scientific knowledge; researchers must be aware of their place in the study in relation to the subjects and how to treat subjects ethically in their own surroundings; researchers should evaluate previous studies to explore new, untouched areas while also critically evaluating research to see how it can be improved.

Q59. [Essay]

You are working for a community development organization in a city with high rates of unemployment, poverty, high school attrition, and juvenile delinquency. Your organization wants to begin an afternoon computer training program for young people. Explain how descriptive, exploratory, explanatory, and evaluation research can all be used to help start and later maintain this program.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Descriptive research—understand and describe the target population; exploratory research—how people get along in a particular setting, what meanings do they give to their actions, and what issues do they face; explanatory research—identify cause and effects of a social phenomenon and then predict how one phenomenon may change in response to another; evaluation research—determine how the program set in place is affecting the target population.

Q60. [Essay]

Using the examples on Internet use and social relations found in Chapter 1, define and describe the difference between quantitative and qualitative methods in social research. How did the researchers' choice of qualitative or quantitative methods strengthen their conclusions?

Suggested answer: Sample response: Quantitative methods—numerical data used to report findings as percentages and other statistics that summarize the relationships among variables; quantitative methods often use motive for research such as explanation, description, or evaluation; quantitative methods are usually implemented to generalize to the larger public but do not provide detail on smaller, subgroups; qualitative methods—focuses on actual text and most often uses exploration as a motive; qualitative data give researchers a lot of information about a few people, but the findings cannot be generalizable to the whole population.
