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Topic 2: Friendly behaviours

Objectives: To begin thinking about what we look for in a friend
To introduce the idea of the qualities of a friend and which ones we value most.

Materials: You will need to print out and copy a number of the activities
Some of the activities are best enlarged to A3
Some of the activities are best laminated so that you can use them again.

Timing: This topic will take up to five sessions to complete.



Topic 2: Friendly behaviours

Activity	Teacher notes
Friendly words (Activity 4)	An activity to explore the meaning of different qualities and which ones are important.
Talkabout trumps (Activity 5)	A card game to introduce qualities where each player chooses a character they like the best based on category ratings such as kindness or coolness.
Friendship ratings (Activity 6)	The children take it in turns to select a card and place it on a rating scale to show how important that quality is in a friend. The group can then discuss differences.
My top five (Activity 7)	The children then consider which qualities they would select as their top five qualities for a friend.
I like my friend because... (Activity 8)	The children choose two close friends and select the qualities that best describe each of them.
Recipe for a friend (Activity 9)	The group decides through voting which top six qualities make the best recipe for a friend.



Activity 4: Friendly words

Preparation

Print and cut out the friendly words (NB this activity is better in colour).

Laminate them if you wish to use them again in the future.

Instructions

- Explain to the group that in the next few sessions they are going to be thinking about the qualities of a friend, which qualities they might look for and which are the most important friendly behaviours to have.
- In this first activity, the children are going to think about what key words mean.
- Look at one of the words... what do the children think it means? Now look at the next one.
- When you have looked at all six words, ask the children to think about which is most important to them. Then they take it in turns to go around the group and to place a smiley face next to the one that is their choice.
- Which one has the most smiley faces?

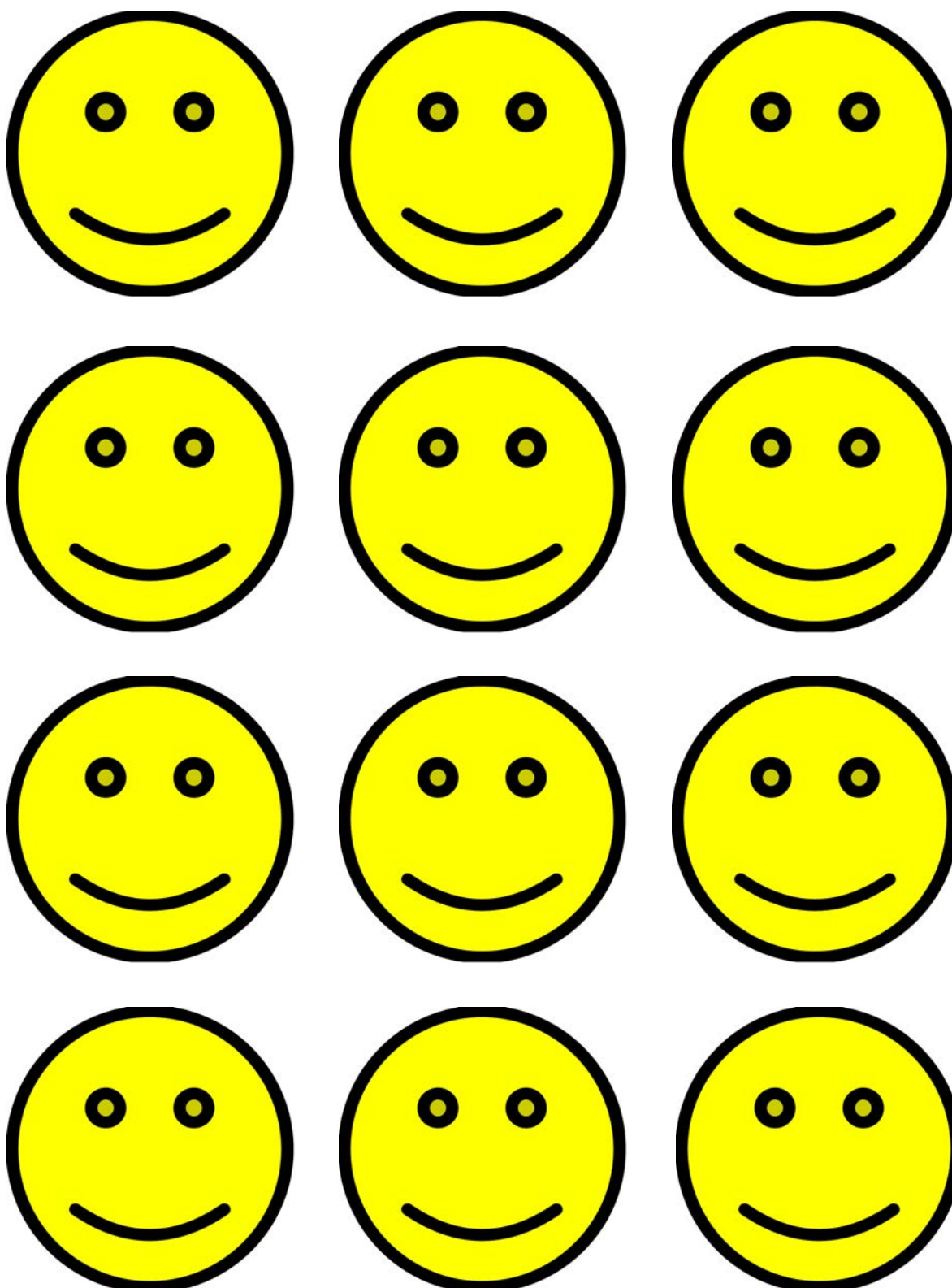

Activity 5: Talkabout trumps

Preparation

Print and cut out the trump cards (NB this activity is better in colour).

Laminate them if you wish to use them again in the future.

Instructions

- Explain to the group that they are going to play a card game where they will think about different characters and decide who they like best.
- Deal one card to each child and place the rest in a pile, face down in the middle of the group.
- Each child takes it in turns to select another card from the pile. They decide which character (card) they like best. They then keep the best one and discard the one they like least by placing it at the bottom of the pile.
- The next child does the same and so the game carries on around the circle for as many rounds as needed until every child is happy with their card and does not replace it.
- Each member of the group then shares their character on the card. Questions you may like to ask are: Why did they choose them? How did they decide who to choose? Were there categories that everyone thought more important?

Activity 6: Friendship ratings

Preparation

Print out the rating scale and cut out the cards (NB this activity is better in colour).

Laminate them if you wish to use them again in the future. Put a strip of Velcro® along the bottom of the rating scale under the numbers and then a square of Velcro on each card.

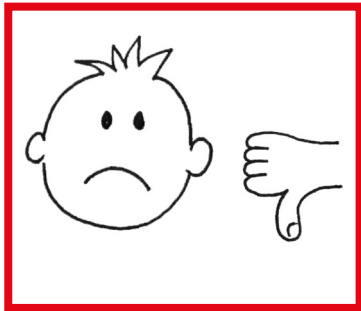
Instructions

- *Explain to the children that they have been thinking a lot about six qualities but there are other things that we often look for in friends.*
- *Show the rating scale to the children and explain that some qualities are important to us and some are less important to us.*
- *The children take it in turns to pick a card. Ask each child what they think about the quality. They then place it on the rating scale.*
- *The group then discuss what they think.*
- *Do they all agree?*

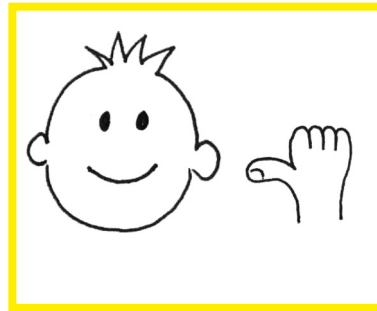

Activity 7: My top five

Preparation

Print out the worksheets and photocopy one for each child.

You will also need the friendship qualities cards from Activity 6 printed out as sheets.

You may wish to enlarge the worksheet to A3.

You will need scissors and glue.

Instructions

- Each child has a worksheet and set of qualities cards. Explain to the children that everyone looks for different qualities in a friend, there is no definite answer.
- The children have to look at the friendship qualities and decide on the top five qualities that they look for in a friend and stick them on their sheet.
- If there is time and the children feel comfortable to do so, each child could share their sheet and explain why they have chosen those five.
- Are there any qualities that everyone has chosen? Which are the most common?

Activity 8: I like my friend because...

Preparation

Print out and photocopy the worksheet.

You will need the friendship qualities from Activity 6.

You will also need scissors and glue.

Instructions

- Each child needs a worksheet and set of cards from Activity 6.
- Explain to the children that you have talked a lot about the qualities people look for in a friend. In this activity they are going to think about a friend of theirs and which qualities their friend possesses.
- The children put the name of one friend in the centre of their sheet and then cut and stick six of their qualities around in the boxes.
- The children could complete this for two or three different friends.
- Are there qualities that are seen for all their friends? Do people have friends with qualities similar to those on their top five?

Instructions

- *Explain to the children that you have been talking a lot about qualities of a friend and now you are going to create a recipe for the best friend as a group.*
- *Discuss as a group the six most important qualities to make the perfect friend. The children could have their top five sheets (Activity 7) in front of them as a prompt.*
- *You may like to complete this activity by having a list of the ideas and then doing a group vote for the most popular to put on the sheet.*
- *The children or facilitator then write or stick the qualities cards (from Activity 6) onto the recipe sheet. Does everyone agree?*
