11. The juvenile system aims to provide services, not punishment, seeking to protect youths from future trouble. Outcomes are negotiated with – with the idea that a child is not capable of having a criminal mind. They have great leeway and aim to act in the best interest of the child. Juvenile courts often use non-criminal justice terms.
12. Each arrest could blow up into a conflict and will generate a lot of paperwork and labor-intensive effort. Some arrests make a situation even worse.
13. Intermediate sanctions are correctional efforts that fall between probation and imprisonment, generally as part of community corrections. Examples: intensive supervision programs, halfway houses, day-reporting centers, monetary sanctions (restitution, fines), community service centers, house arrest, intermittent imprisonment, split sentences.
14. Criminality is learned within intimate social groups. “A person becomes delinquent because of an excess of definitions favorable to violation of law over definitions unfavorable to violation of the law.”
15. Deny responsibility – I was drunk; it was my friend’s idea. Deny injury – nobody got hurt; the store won’t miss it. Deny there’s a victim – they had it coming; nobody owned it anyway. Condemn the condemners – you do the same things yourself; you do more harm than I ever do. Appeal to higher loyalties – I stole it for my buddies; I’ve got to stand by my friends.
