1) FALSE

Buffers act to minimize changes in pH, which sometimes involves releasing hydrogen ions into solution but other times involves taking up hydrogen ions from the solution.

2) FALSE

Nonpolar molecules are hydrophobic, or "water fearing."

3) TRUE

The hydrogen bonds in water are what makes it effective in cooling organisms as they sweat.

4) FALSE

Hydrophobic molecules cannot form hydrogen bonds since they lack polar atoms.

Chemicals that do not dissolve in water are hydrophobic.

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37) hydroxide

Besides hydroxide, water produces a proton for the other ion when it ionizes.

38) pH

pH ranges from strongly acidic to strongly basic.

39) acidic

Examples of acids include lemon juice and stomach acid.

40) covalent

Atoms within a water molecule share electrons, so the bonds formed are covalent.

41) hydrogen

Aquatic organisms in cold lakes are saved in the winter by the lower density of water ice since water ice floats, rather than sinking and freezing the entire pond from the bottom up.

42) acid

Acids release protons, lowering pH.

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
