Review Questions

1. How do you open the Windows desktop? How do you close the desktop?

Answer: Click the **Desktop** tile on the Start screen. If the desktop has already been opened, point to the upper-left corner of the **Start** screen, and click the **Desktop** thumbnail.

Answer: Press and drag the top of the desktop down to the bottom of the screen.

2. How do you install an app that uses the Windows 8 interface? How do you uninstall a Windows 8 app?

Answer: Find and install the app using the Windows Store app.

Answer: Right-click the app tile, and select **Uninstall** from the status bar that appears at the bottom of the screen.

3. How do you access the Apps screen?

Answer: On the Start screen, click the **down arrow** near the lower-left corner of the screen.

4. How do you add a tile to the Start screen?

Answer: Search for the app. In the Search results right-click the app, and select **Pin to Start**.

5. How do you sign out from the computer? How do you shut down the computer?

Answer: Sign out by clicking the user name on the Start screen, and then select **Sign out**, or press **Win+X**, select **Shut down or sign out**, and then click **Sign out**.

Answer: Shut down the computer by clicking the **Settings** wheel on the charms bar. Click the **Power** button, and then select **Shut down**, or press **Win+X**, select **Shut down or sign out**, and then click **Shut down**.

Answer: Open the People app from the Start screen, click Connected to, and then click Add an account. Choose an option from the accounts listed, and then click Connect.

Overview

Chapter 1 covers the Windows operating systems, and how this OS provides the interface between users and applications and hardware devices. Students will learn to use several Windows tools and utilities that are useful to view and manage storage devices, examine a system, and troubleshoot simple problems with hardware and applications. Students will also learn how Windows connects to a network and accesses resources on a network, as well as, how to create and manage user accounts.

Chapter Objectives

After reading this chapter and completing the exercises, the student will be able to:

- Use Windows to interface with users, files and folders, applications, and hardware
- Use Windows tools to explore, examine, and support the system
- Make network connections using Windows
- Manage local user accounts and Microsoft accounts in Windows

Teaching Tips

Windows Interfaces

1. Define how an operating system functions, noting that it facilitates communications between users and applications and users and hardware.
2. List some of the functions of an operating system:
 - a. Provide a user interface
 - b. Manage files
 - c. Manage hardware
 - d. Manage applications
3. Explain that IT support technicians should be very familiar with Windows 8 and Windows 7. Point out that Windows 10 has been released but the book was written before it was released.
4. Discuss how Windows OS offers a graphical user interface (GUI) that uses graphics instead of a command-driven interface. Mention that Windows 8 has two graphical interfaces: the modern interface and the desktop.

Windows 8 Modern Interface

1. Discuss the characteristics of the Windows 8 modern interface, pointing out that it was formerly called the Metro User Interface or Metro UI.
2. Mention that the modern interface uses pages in comparison to the windows used on the desktop.
3. Discuss the charms bar and demonstrate how to select the Settings charm.
4. Point out the Power icon in the upper-right corner of the Start screen and discuss the options that are available when clicking on the Power icon.

Windows 8 Desktop

1. Discuss how to switch from the Windows modern interface to the desktop interface.
2. While in the desktop interface, demonstrate how to launch a program from the desktop using one of the following methods:
 - Start button
 - Quick Launch menu
 - Pin to taskbar
 - Double-click the program file name in File Explorer
 - Shortcut on desktop
 - Run box

Windows 7 Desktop

1. Define a desktop as the initial screen displayed when a user logs into Windows.
2. Demonstrate the use of the Aero user interface within Windows 7/Vista and discuss how this interface affects resource requirements.
3. Show students how the start menu is organized in Windows 7/Vista and compare this to Windows 8.

4. Identify the taskbar within Windows 7 and illustrate some of the functionality of the taskbar. You should show the following:
 - a. Jump list
 - b. Aero peek
 - c. Notification area (or system tray, or systray)
5. Explain that a Windows 7 library is a collection of folders.

Windows Tools for Users and Technicians

Windows 8 File Explorer and Windows 7 Windows Explorer

1. Explore the use of the Windows 8 File Explorer and Windows 7 Windows Explorer. Show how Explorer can be used to find folders and files on a computer.
2. Explain a root directory as the very base of a file system, under which all other directories are subdirectories.
3. Emphasize how the root directory changes for different volumes. In other words, the root directory for the C: volume is different from the root directory of the D: volume because each volume has its own root directory.
4. Provide a more detailed explanation for what a subdirectory / child directory / folder is, and then show how to find a subdirectory when given a path.
5. Explain how a filename is used to identify a file, while a file extension is used to identify the type of file involved. Give an example of a path to a file with a visible file extension.
6. Define how the navigation pane can be used in Windows Explorer to quickly navigate multiple levels of folders.
7. Show how to change the appearance of folders and files within Windows Explorer.
8. When using the Details view for a folder, show how to add additional columns to the window for additional information.
9. Demonstrate how the Search box can be used for locating files.

10. Use the various additional features with Windows Explorer to emphasize how students can use the tool to find and navigate the Windows file system.
11. Show how to perform the following operations using Windows Explorer:
 - a. Create a folder
 - b. Create a file
 - c. Copy a file or folder
 - d. Drag and drop file / folder to new location
 - e. Rename a file or folder
 - f. Delete a file or folder
 - g. Select multiple items either with Shift or Ctrl
12. Note that files are sent to the Recycle bin when deleted, although files within the bin are not really deleted.
13. Demonstrate how to create a shortcut on the Windows desktop.

The Control Panel

1. Introduce the Windows Control Panel as a window containing several small utility programs called applets. Mention that these applets are used to manage hardware, software, users, and the system.
2. Explain that there are different views available in Control: Category view and Classic view.
3. Demonstrate the following Control Panel applets:
 - Date and Time applet
 - Sound applet
 - Administrative Tools
 - Windows Firewall
 - Windows Defender
 - BitLocker Drive Encryption
 - Action Center
 - Folder Options applet

Folder Options

1. Explore the Folder Options applet in Control Panel. Demonstrate how to change Folder Options so that file extensions are visible.

Power Options

1. Explain that the Power Options applet can be used to help conserve power and increase the time before a battery pack on a laptop needs recharging.
2. Discuss the various power-saving states:
 - Sleep mode (suspend mode)
 - Hibernation

System Window

1. Demonstrate how to find the System window, and point out what useful information can be found there, such as memory installed, type of OS, and Windows edition.

2. Describe the difference between a 32-bit operating system and a 64-bit operating system.
3. Explain how to activate Windows using the Activate Windows option within the System Window.

System Information Window

1. The System information (msinfo32.exe) window should be explored. Students should be aware of what information can be found in this application.
2. Describe how a device driver is a piece of software that is used by an operating system to communicate with specific hardware.

Action Center

1. Introduce the Action Center, and explain the kind of information typically presented by the Action Center, such as important system issues.
2. Show how to retrieve archived messages in the Action Center to view a history of problems that have occurred on the computer.

Windows Network Connections

1. Explain that Windows offers three ways to share resources on a network: workgroups, homegroups, and domains.

Windows Workgroup and Homegroup

1. Introduce students to the term peer-to-peer (P2P) network, which is a network that doesn't have centralized control.
2. Discuss the differences between Workgroups and Homegroups. Point out that a homegroup provides less security than a workgroup.

Windows Domain

1. Explain to students that a Windows domain is a type of client-server network, where resources are managed by centralized computers.

2. Introduce students to Windows Server Active Directory, which is a directory database that hold information about every user and device in a domain.

Public and Private Networks

1. Explain to students that Windows 8 offers two types of network security:
 - Public network
 - Private network
2. Discuss the three network security options that Windows 7 offers:
 - Public network
 - Home network
 - Work network

Making a Windows 8 Network Connection

1. Mention that in order to make a wired connection to a network, simply plug in the network cable and Windows will do the rest.
2. Demonstrate how to create a wireless connection in Windows 8. Point out to students that in later chapters they will learn to use the Network and Sharing Center to troubleshoot network problems.

Windows 7: Making a Windows 7 Connection

1. Outline the steps necessary to connect to a wireless network via Windows 7.

Domain Setup

1. Explain how to authenticate to a Windows domain.

Windows User Accounts

1. Discuss the various types and privileges for user accounts in Windows:
 - The scope of the account
 - Privileges for the account
 - A Microsoft account

Using a Microsoft Account with Windows 8

1. Highlight the advantages and disadvantages of signing in to Windows using a Microsoft account:
 - Personal settings across several devices
 - OneDrive storage in the cloud

- Windows Store
 - Private settings stored on the local computer
2. Demonstrate how to connect an existing local account or network ID to a Microsoft account. Point out that you can also switch the user account from a Microsoft account back to a local account or network ID.
 3. Discuss where the three different accounts are authenticated:
 - a. Local account is authenticated on the local computer and gives access to the local computer.
 - b. A network ID is authenticated by a computer on the network and gives access to the local computer and other resources on the network.
 - c. A Microsoft account is authenticated on the live.com website, which gives access to the local computer and online resources.

User Account Control Box

1. Elaborate on how the User Account Control (UAC) dialog box is used to escalate privileges only when necessary for applications to run.
2. Explain the difference between an Administrator account and a standard user account, and discuss how the UAC box facilitates standard user accounts to have minimal Administrator access.
