Correct Answer : Violent crimes are crimes against people. They include murder, sexual assault, assault, battery, and robbery. Property crimes are the most common form of criminal activity. The goal is economic gain of the damaging or property. Property crimes include larceny, burglary, motor vehicle theft, and arson. Public order crimes are behaviors that have been labeled criminal because they are contrary to shared values, customs, and norms. They include public drunkenness, prostitution, gambling, and illegal drug use. White-collar crimes are nonviolent crimes committed by business entities or individuals to gain a personal or business advantage. Organized crimes are illegal acts carried out by illegal organizations engaged in the market for illegal goods or services, such as illicit drugs or firearms. High-tech crimes are the newest variation on crime and are related to the increased presence of computers in everyday life. Cybercrimes, such as soliciting minors and defrauding consumers through false financial investments, fall under this category.

67 : Describe the Uniform Crime Report (UCR). When doing so, please discuss who is responsible for compiling this crime measurement, when was it officially implemented, and what does it include when reported? Next, please compare and contrast Part I and Part II crimes of the UCR.

Correct Answer : The UCR was created in 1930 and is compiled and reported by the FBI. The UCR has attempted to measure the overall rate of crime in the United States by organizing "crimes known to the police." The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) relies on voluntary participation of local law enforcement agencies. Three basic measurements include number of persons arrested; number of crimes reported by victims, witnesses, or police themselves; and number of officers and support law enforcement specialists. Part I offenses are crimes reported by the FBI in the UCR and include murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft. Part I offenses are measured because of their seriousness and frequency. They give the FBI the crime picture in the United States. The majority of Part I offenses committed are property crimes. Part II offenses include misdemeanors and felonies. Part II offenses far outweigh Part I offenses. Part II offenses are only measured by arrest data. Part II offenses include drug abuse violations, driving under the influence, fraud, vandalism, prostitution, gambling, and many more. *More Part II crimes occur annually, than Part I offenses.?

68 : Compare and contrast victim surveys and self-reported surveys.

Correct Answer : • Victim's surveys are a method of gathering crime data that directly surveys participants to determine their experiences as victims of crime. • The first large-scale victims' survey took place in 1966. • Victim surveys indicate the "dark figure of crime" in that they get information on crimes not reported to police. • The U.S. Census Bureau now conducts an annual survey titled the NCVS, which questions participants about their experiences with crimes. • NCVS gives victims a voice in the criminal justice process. • Self-reported surveys are a method

of gathering crime data that relies on participants to reveal and detail their own criminal or delinquent behavior. • They are most useful in situations in which the group to be studied is already gathered in an institutional setting. • There is no penalty for admitting to criminal activity in a self-reported survey, so subjects are forthcoming in discussing their behavior. • The data from self-reported surveys reveal a much larger dark figure of crime than the UCR or NCVS.

70 : Discuss social process theories. Include descriptions of two particular theories found within this school of criminology.

Correct Answer : • Social process theories are a school of criminology that considers criminal behavior to be the predictable result of a person's interaction with his or her environment. According to these theories, everybody has the potential for wrongdoing. • Those who act on this potential are conditioned to do so by family or peer groups or by institutions such as the media. • Learning theory is the hypothesis that delinquents and criminals must be taught both the practical and emotional skills necessary to partake in illegal activity. • Labeling theory is the hypothesis that society creates crime and criminals by labeling certain behavior and certain people as deviant; the stigma that results from this social process excludes a person from the community, thereby increasing the chances that she or he will adopt the label as her or his identity and engage in a pattern of criminal behavior.

71 : Please explain in detail the routine activities theory of victimization. When doing so, be sure to discuss what the theory states regarding how one may become a victim of a crime.

Correct Answer : • Anybody can be a victim of crime. This does not mean, however, that everybody is at an equal risk of being victimized. For instance, residents of neighborhoods with heavy concentrations of payday lending businesses, which loan funds at burdensome interest rates on short notice, are targeted by criminals at unusually high rates. To better explain the circumstances surrounding this type of victimization, criminologists Larry Cohen and Marcus Felson devised the routine activities theory. According to Cohen and Felson, most criminal acts require the following: (1) a likely offender, (2) a suitable target (a person or an object), and (3) the absence of a capable guardian—that is, any person (not necessarily a law enforcement agent) whose presence or proximity prevents a crime from happening. When these three factors are present, the likelihood of crime rises. Cohen and Felson cite routine activities theory in explaining the link between payday lenders and crime. People who use payday lenders often leave those establishments with large sums of cash late at night or during weekends, when there is less street traffic. Consequently, they act as suitable targets, attracting likely offenders to neighborhoods where the payday lenders are located.

72 : One of the most widespread self-reported surveys in the United States, The Drug Use Forecasting Program, collects information on narcotics use from arrestees who have been brought into booking facilities. Since there is no penalty for admitting to criminal activity in a self-

reported survey when administered by a researcher, subjects tend to be more forthcoming in discussing their behavior. As a result, this has led researchers to a striking conclusion: the dark figure of crime, known as the actual amount of crime that takes place, appears to be much larger than the UCR or NCVS would suggest. However, as Sheriff of your county and overseer of the jail, you have been asked by the researcher to have your deputies collect the survey instruments. Knowing that your deputies will now be seeing suspects information regarding their actual criminal activity, do you decline the request of the researcher, or do you have your deputies follow through by collecting the data? Please fully explain your plan.

73 : Although crime and victimization rates have decreased across racial lines over the past twenty years in the U.S., the trends have been less positive for African Americans than for whites. For example, blacks are 6.3 times more likely to be homicide victims than whites and significantly more likely to be homicide offenders. African Americans are particularly susceptible to gun violence, with firearm murder rates of 14.6 per 100,000 adults, compared to 1.9 for whites and 4.0 for Hispanics. Chicagos West Garfield Park neighborhood, which is 96 percent black, has a homicide rate of 116 per 100,000 people. In comparison, Honduras, the worldwide leader in murders, has a homicide rate of only 90 per 100,000. As the newly elected Mayor of Chicago, you have a major gang problem stemming from illegal drug territorial disputes within city limits, which is ultimately responsible for a major percentage of recent African American homicides. In your role as Mayor, you must act. How will you deal with this epidemic, and more specifically, who will you call upon to assist with these efforts and what will be your plan? Consequently, residents tend to ignore the important institutions in the community, such as businesses and education, causing further erosion and an increase in the conditions that lead to crime. You decide you must formulate a proposal to begin to address the issues that are leading to this social disorganization. What will be your strategy, and who will you call upon to help you carry it out? Please fully explain.
