1. Why does organized crime remain popular in the United States?

(a) Many people desire the things that organized crime provides: illegal drugs, some types of gambling, pornography, and prostitution.

2. What are two possible reasons for the drop in the crime rate in the United States since the 1980s?

There are four possible answers:

(a) The get-tough approach; (b) A drop in birth rates in the years previous leading to a lower number of young people; (c) A decline in crack cocaine gang wars as the market stabilized; or (d) A decline in the levels of lead contamination that can impair brain development.

3. What are the differences between amateur burglars and professional burglars?

Amateur burglars are typically young males who engage in only a few burglaries and then abandon this criminal activity; Professional burglars tend to be older and very skilled, and the value of their stolen items easily surpasses what amateurs steal

4. What is one major strength of self-report surveys? What is one major weakness?

Self-report surveys allow researchers to get information about criminal behavior by simply asking, which is the easiest way to get hard-to-access information. Weaknesses of self-report surveys include that respondents do not always tell the truth, hard to reach certain segments

of the adolescent population who may be at higher risk of offending; hard to get high enough rates of response on serious crime to use the data

5. How do peers influence criminal behavior during adolescence?
Adolescent friendships are extremely important, but juveniles tend to learn criminal behavior from their peers.

6. What distinguishes violent crime from other types of criminal behavior?
Violent crime involves actual or threatened physical injury by one or more offenders against one or more victims.

7. What are the demographic characteristics of the majority of offenders?
Most offenders are young, male, and live in major cities as opposed to urban areas.

8. What is the main difference between sexual assault and rape?
Rape involves the penetration of a victim with a body part or other object without consent. Sexual assault involves unwanted sexual contact that does not constitute rape.

9. According to national survey evidence, who are the most common victims of sexual assault and rape? Who are the most common perpetrators?
Women and girls experience about 90% of all rapes and sexual assaults. National survey evidence finds that about 18% of women have been raped and that 27% have been sexually assaulted. Nonstrangers commit about four-fifths of rapes according to this evidence, with male intimates (current and former husbands and partners) committing half of the rapes suffered by women and one-fourth of the sexual assaults

10. What are the major differences between simple assault and aggravated assault?
Aggravated assault is the intentional causing of serious physical injury with or without a deadly weapon or the intentional attempt or threat of serious bodily harm with a deadly weapon. Simple assault involves only minor injuries and does not involve the use of a weapon.

11. Why are the data on hate crimes considered to be incomplete?
Most hate crimes go unreported by victims, and many police precincts do not report the hate crimes they hear about to the FBI.

Consensual crime includes illegal drug use, prostitution, and some forms of gambling.

13. Why is terrorism a type of crime that is particularly hard to prevent?

Terrorists are highly motivated, and as long as they perceive that their cruel acts may help achieve their goals, they will continue to perform them.

14. List one major strength and one major weakness of the National Crime Victimization Survey.

Possible strengths include the large, random sample used by the NCVS, and the likelihood that it reports more accurate crime rates. Possible weaknesses include that there are no measurements of victimization for children under 12, or that respondents may not be answering questions accurately.

15. What is the difference between robbery and burglary?

Robbery refers to the taking of someone's possession(s) by using physical force or the threat of physical force; burglary is the illegal entry into a home, store or other building to commit a theft, but does not use physical force or the threat of force.

Essay Questions

1. Views on consensual crime laws are mixed. Briefly describe both sides of the issue of whether or not laws should regulate consensual crime, making sure to include information supporting those laws along with information refuting them.

Strong answers will mention the following:

- *Many activities can be very dangerous, but they are entirely legal (downhill skiing); others have age limits or other restrictions (alcohol use)*
- *Not the job of the government to regulate actions that individuals are willing to do*
- *Laws regulating consensual crime sometimes lead to an uptick, like Prohibition era alcohol laws*
- *Some argue that these activities should be decriminalized; no evidence that doing this would increase levels of the behavior*

2. Describe the different types of homicide, making sure to distinguish between all five different types used in most states.

- *first-degree murder involves a killing that is willful and premeditated.*
- *second-degree murder an intentional killing that is not premeditated or a killing stemming from an offender's blatant disregard for human life*
- *voluntary manslaughter refers to an unintentional killing out of intense emotion such as anger or jealousy*
- *involuntary manslaughter refers to killing a person because the offender acted negligently or recklessly*
- *felony murder. is a homicide that occurs during the commission of a felony such as a robbery*

3. What are the two categories of crime described by the UCR reports? Make sure that you include a description of each category, and those categories break down further into specific crimes.
- *Part 1 Offenses (violent crimes and property crimes)*
 - *The Part I violent crimes include homicide, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault, while the Part I property crimes include burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson*
 - *Part 2 Offenses (less serious crimes)*
 - *simple assault, forgery and counterfeiting, fraud, and gambling*

4. What are the problems with crime recording rates for the UCR discussed in your textbook?
Answers will vary, but will include some key information. Things to look for:
- *UCR data are based on crimes known to the police -- The UCR's term for the*
 - *official number of crimes that the police report to the UCR and that the UCR, in turn, reports to the public*
 - *Based on citizens' complaints to the police, which are very low*
 - *Also based on police recording those crimes, which means that Police determine that a crime did occur (founding stage).*
 - *Police will only report the most serious crime if 2 or more offenses occur*
 - *Some police departments underreport crime to make rates look lower*

5. List and describe two of the sociological models used to explain the causes of criminal behavior.
Answers will include two of the following:
- ***Social ecology explanations*** *say that certain physical and social characteristics of neighborhoods affect the amount of crime and victimization found in these neighborhoods*
 - ***Blocked opportunity***: *poverty leads individuals to be unable to move up in terms of economic status, leading to "angry aggression" and criminal behavior*
 - ***Anomie theory***: *deviance among the poor results from frustration over failure to become economically successful through working*
