Suggested answer: Sample response: Sociology is the scientific study of how society shapes individual people and groups, as well as individual people and groups shape society. Sociology employs the scientific method to study climate change in a different way than psychology and political science. For example, psychology focuses on the individual and less on the broader society. And political science focuses on how climate change impacts the electoral system and suggests policy solutions.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Sociology is the scientific study of how society and human relationships influence each other. With respect to society's impact on Greta, She was exposed to environmental reports, including the social and political landscape, at a young age involving climate change, and lives in a democratic nation that has freedom of speech, etc. And regarding Greta's impact on society, she has influenced society by her boldness and persistence in sharing her concerns about global warming, including speaking at the United Nations, and has won numerous awards.

Doing so challenges the status quo, not taking things for granted, and moving beyond common sense. Another one is media literacy to sort fact from fiction in order not be misled. Having accurate information and knowledge is critical in moving forward or advancing our democratic society. And lastly, citizenship involving being civically mindful and active in doing a cost-benefit analysis of community member's arguments pertaining to their well-being, as well as sharing research knowledge while at work all demonstrate building a healthy democracy.

Suggested answer: Sample response: The scientific method generates truthful knowledge by starting with theoretical explanations to generate research problems about patterns of social life. Then develop hypotheses to test our theory. The scientific method demands that sociologists collect empirical data—i.e., information that can be observed using our human senses without letting our personal experiences, beliefs, and values interfere with our research findings or conclusions (objectivity). Collecting empirical data in a systematic way—i.e., following strict steps helps researchers develop objectivity. However, intersubjectivity focuses on how multiple sociologists engaged in conversation and collaboration on a research problem to come to a scientific agreement about patterns of social life rather than just relying only on one researcher's observations and interpretations of the empirical data collected.

Suggested answer: Sample response: The social science research documents social inequalities and societal transformations. The collection and application of empirical data by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Bureau of Labor Statistics, and World Health Organization, allows us to identify the uneven toll that the COVID-19 pandemic took/is taking across racial and ethnic groups. The data they provide are pivotal for documenting and understanding the social determinants of health inequities. In doing so, challenges stereotypes and misinformation, especially of Chinese Americans. Governmental policies and CDC guidelines with respect to the distribution of and access to vaccines and health care can be evaluated and then improved, if need to be, to address health inequities.
